Geoffrey A. Talmon, MD, MEd Associate Dean for Medical Education Professor and Vice Chair for Medical Education, Pathology, Microbiology & Immunology Dr. Nancy Krusen is the founding program director for the entry-level occupational therapy clinical doctorate at UNMC. Her educational philosophy is grounded in occupational adaptation and translational science. Occupational adaptation proposes the development of adaptive strategies to manage daily life challenges. Translational science engages knowledge users to create innovations for health and wellness. These values help her find the just-right challenge in service, teaching and learning, mentoring, and education-based scholarship.

At the end each day, Dr. Krusen asks herself whether she has made a difference. She believes that educators plant seeds for trees in the shade of which we may never sit. She values the past and looks to the future and feels there is always more to learn and more to do.

A strong advocate for mentoring both faculty and students, Dr. Justin Mott believes in assessing each mentee individually, based on their strengths, needs, goals and weaknesses. In addition to liver disease and DNA and RNA biology, Dr. Mott teaches about principles of leadership, communication, emotional intelligence, bias, overcoming barriers to inclusion, and conflict resolution to students and faculty.

He has received numerous awards throughout his career, including the Distinguished Graduate Student Mentor Award and the UNMC-wide Impact in Education Varner Educator Laureate Award.

Dr. Geoffrey Talmon has more than 15 years of experience mentoring and guiding both faculty and students at UNMC. He was the inaugural director of the Interprofessional Academy of Educators, the UNMC Impact in Education Varner Educator Laureate awardee in 2021, and the University of Nebraska Outstanding Teaching and Instructional Creativity Award recipient in 2023.

His innovations include development of a pathology externship, an off-ramp master's degree for medical students, and the first pathology course for high schoolers in the nation. Dr. Talmon was one of the leaders of the College of Medicine's curriculum redesign and served as pathology residency director. The book he co-edited, "Mind the Gap: Generational Differences in Medical Education," is the first work dedicated to managing intergenerational conflict in medical education.

Reimagining Responsive Teaching

As educators, we are teaching and supporting our learners in a rapidly changing landscape. Institutional environments are changing, social and political climates are changing, perceptions of higher education are changing, workforce needs are changing, technology is changing, our learners are changing — and the pace of change in many of these areas is not likely to be slower than it is today.

This inspiring session will explore what it means to teach well and thrive (not just survive!) amid such change through intentional adoption of responsive teaching strategies.

Dr. Deepak Keshwani is a faculty member and director of undergraduate programs in the department of biological systems engineering at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He serves as a faculty fellow for student success in the College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources at UNL and holds a courtesy appointment in the department of agricultural leadership, education and communication.

Dr. Keshwani teaches a variety of courses ranging from first-year orientation courses to project-based capstone courses. His scholarly interests include bioprocess and biosystems modeling, design of serious educational video games and student success. Dr. Keshwani also mentors a first-year learning community focused on leadership, service and civic engagement.

Self-Reflection Driven OSCEs

Self-reflection allows for personal growth and the development of new knowledge, without direct faculty support. A team of nursing faculty set out to determine if allowing for self-guided reflection would help students develop their knowledge and skills for the observed structured clinical examination (OSCE). Students were allowed to self-evaluate a recording of their simulation performance, identify needed remediation, and modify their skills and approach. Join experts for an insightful presentation that explores how self-reflection and peer debriefing can significantly enhance the learning experience and prepare nursing students (and beyond) for successful clinical practice.


