- Providing support to and advocating for the university's international community including students, employees and scholars;
- Facilitating and coordinating inclusive opportunities for global learning experiences;
- Coordinating bilateral exchange programs for health science rotations and research with UNMC's global partners;
- Developing and managing observership and training programs;
- Managing the US immigration and visa sponsorships of international students, faculty, staff, and visitors on behalf of UNMC;
- Collaborating with UNMC departments to ensure compliance with UNMC policies including compliance training, immunizations, and export control;
- Developing and maintaining academic collaborations and business partnerships;
- Developing capacity in the healthcare sector;
- Bolstering economic development in Nebraska and the world:
- Coordinating various international and cultural engagement opportunities.



INTERNATIONAL STUDENT ORIENTATION

UNMC welcomed 108 new international students in 2023. These students represent 22 countries and are from 41 academic health sciences programs across all colleges.

Jane Meza, PhD, associate vice chancellor for global engagement, welcomed the students at both orientation sessions. The core of the International Student Orientation (ISO) consists of formal presentations on variety of topics.

An integral part of the ISO is the popular international student ambassador program, which has been offered for the past decade. UNMC students volunteer to serve as ambassadors and are matched with incoming students. The purpose of this program is for the ambassadors to help the incoming students have a successful transition to UNMC.

Following the structured spring and fall sessions, the office of global engagement (OGE) organized trips for the new students to the Henry Doorly Zoo and the Nebraska

Crossing Outlet Mall. In addition, OGE hosted an International Student Welcome Lunch and Ambassador Appreciation.

"The ability to positively influence and give back to my community, as well as help them (residents of Mexico) learn about the resources available and improve care management, is what motivated me to embark on this service trip," said Mitsy Dasa, nursing student, Class of 2024. Dasa is referring to the Student Association for Global Health (SAGH) service trip in which three nursing students participated in a one-week service trip to Orizaba and Cordoba, Veracruz, Mexico through UNMC's partner Universidad de Anahuac Veracruz (UAV) Medical School.

Three UNMC nursing students had the opportunity to visit various care settings in Veracruz to experience healthcare delivery in another country. The students went to a government clinic that served as a primary care/preventative care. This clinic offered nutrition counseling, vaccines, vision screening, PT/OT consultations, MRIs, general checkups and an emergency room. The students also went to a public hospital where they toured all the units including pediatrics, labor and delivery, NICU, adult ICU, emergency room and the operating room. After the tour, the students did 2-hour rotations in each unit to shadow and learn more about the Mexican inpatient health delivery system.

One of the major activities was the health fair at one of the elementary schools, which was sponsored by (UAV). The UNMC students had a booth with supplies they took to Mexico and demonstrated to the children and their parents how to properly brush their teeth.

"My favorite part of this service trip was being out in the community and interacting with the children and families. It was so fun to be providing donations for these families in need and seeing the children's excitement was very heartwarming," Isabella Almanza said. "I also really loved staying with my host family and made amazing friends with the students at Anahuac, it is a very special bond, and I am still very close with the medical students involved in the service trip."

"What I like the most about this trip is the friendships I made and the small impact we made with the patients we cared for at the hospital and at the health fair. The University of Anahuac students made us feel at home," Dasa said. "The

Ben Nelson Fellows

Six Ukrainian health care professionals spent time at UNMC in November 2023 as UNMC continues to build its relationship with the country.

Nina Tronenko, a clinical psychologist who works with psychological rehabilitation of war veterans, said the visit gave the delegation a different angle to look at the world. Tronenko described the med center's attitude as humane and focused on positive values, support and protection.

Through its history of hosting international delegations, UNMC offers a way to share information about its educational and research programs, said Jane Meza, PhD, associate vice chancellor for global engagement.

"We learned so much from them, and I know that they've learned a lot from us, and that's really the value of doing this," Dr. Meza said. "It's been heartbreaking to hear their stories and to learn how much they work and dedicate their own volunteer time to their country."

In November, the newest Ukrainian delegation visited Washington D.C. and Nebraska through the Congressional Office for International Leadership and its Senator Ben Nelson Fellows program, which recognizes the former U.S. senator from Nebraska. The delegates are chosen as rising leaders in the medical field in Ukraine.

Since 2013, UNMC has been hosting Ben Nelson Fellows through Congressional Office for International Leadership.

The group met with Dean Khan, visited the emergency department at Nebraska Medical Center and toured the Fred & Pamela Buffett Cancer Center. At the Davis Global Center, the delegation saw the Training, Simulation and Quarantine Center and the National Quarantine Unit, watched a training exercise by the Nebraska Biocontainment Unit and saw medical simulation spaces with the iEXCEL program.

Oleksandr Chamorsov, chief psychologist for the Hotline Support Service with the Ministry of Veterans Affairs of Ukraine, said the attitude of the state and society towards veterans and military personnel is impressive, noting that veterans are actively involved in the public sector.

Natalia Chuzhykova, a volunteer who is attached to a brigade with the Ukraine Air Defense Forces, said "I have gained a lot of information here that I will be able to convey to Ukraine, and I believe that it will have an impact on the development of our country."



SEED PROGRAM

Through the College of Allied Health Professions, international students have an opportunity to develop a global perspective on rehabilitation and to learn about physical therapy in the U.S. in the UNMC Global Health Opportunity Program for Summer Experiential Education in Physical Therapy (SEED). This Sixth Annual SEED Program was held virtually from July 10-28, 2023 with 12 attendees.

The online summer program includes self-study sessions, online lectures, live discussions, virtual student roundtables, and campus and program presentations.



In 2023, UNMC had 48 active or pending international agreements for education, research and business collaborations in 21 countries. Fifteen new or renewal agreements were signed with partners in Egypt, Ethiopia, Ghana, Iraq, Japan, Jordan, Lebanon, Panama, Rwanda, Sudan, Turkey and Ukraine.

The office of global engagement partnership activities include reviewing and documenting all international agreements, strengthening relationships with existing partners and developing new strategic partnerships.

These UNMC partners visited campus in 2023 to discuss expanding our collaborations.

Universidad de Anahuac Veracruz (UAV), Mexico - The strategic partnership with UAV was initiated in 2016 when the initial Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was created between UAV and the UNMC College of Public Health. The first activity was the offering of a hybrid course, involving both UAV and UNMC students together, focusing on the principles of public health. Since that time, the program has expanded to include medical Spanish and service-learning exchange programs directed by the UNMC Department of Family Medicine. Upon expiration of the original MOU, it was amended and restated in 2021 to reaffirm our joint commitments to the partnership and to establish a platform for an expanded range of collaborative activities. Reflecting on the success of these initial programs, both institutions expressed the desire to explore and expand the partnership into new areas that would benefit our students, faculty, and the communities we serve.

The purpose of the 2023 leadership visit was to celebrate the partnership's success and, most importantly, to explore other areas of mutual interest. A specific outcome was the development of specific timelines and action steps for the implementation of priority activities.

- Hamamatsu University School of Medicine (HUSM), Japan - This partnership can be traced back to October 2019 when UNMC Chancellor Jeffrey Gold, MD and Jane Meza, PhD, associate vice chancellor for global engagement, visited HUSM. This visit laid the groundwork for what was to become a fruitful collaboration between the two institutions. Following this initial encounter, discussions continued, leading to the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in June 2020. In October 2023, a delegation from HUSM visited UNMC, further strengthening ties between the institutions. Currently, efforts are underway to renew the MOU.
- Kawakita Medical Foundation, Japan This
 delegation visited UNMC to explore how to
 build a network between primary care and
 hospitals, how to use electronic health records
 and how to collaborate with doctors, nurses
 and other healthcare professionals. They also
 toured the Buffett Cancer Center and the Davis
 Global Center.
- Ministry of Health, Uzbekistan The Minister
 of Health of the Republic of Uzbekistan and 10
 other delegation members from the Ministry
 of Health visited UNMC in May and June to
 meet with various college deans and others to
 discuss possible collaborations.

International Visitors


The International Visitor Program, initiated in 2013, is utilized by campus units to bring visitors to UNMC for engagements ranging from a few hours up to one year. The program insures the visitors meet UNMC requirements, such as immunizations, compliance training modules, in addition to UNMC Export Control requirements. In 2023, OGE registered 117 international visitors representing 27 countries.

Tax Preparation Assistance

OGE offered free virtual and in-person tax preparation assistance to the UNMC international community in 2021, with 238 individuals participating.

Visa Sponsorship

OGE assisted and sponsored 807 international students, employees and visitors representing 70 countries to work, study or visit UNMC in 2023. OGE staff advised faculty, staff, sponsored employees and students on all visa and immigration-related issues. OGE also provided advice to UNMC departments and international employees regarding the process and regulations for sponsorship of permanent residence. Services were also offered to the University of Nebraska Omaha to prepare government petitions to sponsor international employees to work there.

Third Annual International Photo Contest

The office of global engagement held its Third Annual International Photo Contest in March. OGE invited participants to submit up to three of their favorite travel photos in the areas of cityscapes/architecture, landscapes/nature, people/animals for the contest. The goal was to have the photos inspire adventure and cultural awareness. An anonymous panel judged the images based on originality and creativity, photographic quality, and communication of culture and place.

The contest had 9 faculty/staff and 13 student/resident participants, with a total of 60 photos submitted. The OGE awarded a grand prize and prizes for the top three entrants in both the student/resident and faculty/staff divisions.
