# Closure of Research (HRPP 2.9)

## **Description:**

This policy describes the criteria for, and process of, closing an on-going human subject research study, and to describe UNMC's requirements of investigators when studies are closed.

#### **Definitions:**

<u>Closure of a study:</u> all research interventions, including analysis of identifiable data, have ceased, or must be ceased.

**Expiration of a study:** the approval is no longer valid because the required continuing review has not received full approval by the IRB by the expiration date.

**Low accrual:** less than 1/2 of expected accrual based on the total accrual divided by the estimated time to accrue subjects in initial IRB application.

## When Closure May Occur:

- When the aims of the study are satisfied.
- As a decision by the investigator before the study aims are met (ex. Lack of funds, poor accrual, departure of the investigator, etc.).
- As a decision by the sponsor or granting agency.
- By the IRB if subject accrual is judged to be inadequate to achieve scientific goals of the study or if resources are deemed inadequate to complete the study in a timely fashion.
- By the IRB/ORA if an investigator fails to respond (via a continuing review or demographic form, as appropriate) to the "Approval Expired" email notifications.

#### **Procedures:**

- All research activities must stop.
- Investigators must inform the IRB:
  - For studies that require continuing review, this is done by submitting a continuing review application or a completion report.
  - For studies that do not require continuing review, submit a message in the message portal in RSS or complete the annual demographic form.



### If a study is closed and you want it reactivated:

If a study is closed by the IRB or ORA:

- For studies that do not require continuing review, the investigator may request reactivation, with adequate justification, within 30 days from date of completion.
  - o Reactivation after 30 days requires submission of a new application.
- For studies that involve continuing review, a new application MUST be submitted.
  The study may not be reactivated.

If a study is closed by the IRB or ORA for failure to respond to the "Approval Expired" notification:

Investigator must submit a new application.

### **Closures for Inadequate Accrual:**

- The IRB or ORA can close a study for low accrual in:
  - Single site studies where UNMC/UNO/CHMC is the sole participant or
  - Multi-site studies where UNMC/UNO/CHMC is a participant but there is no external funding.
- Studies with low or no accrual after 2 review cycles are required to provide an explanation and a detailed plan to increase accrual. Plans might include the following:
  - Additional sites
  - Additional investigators
  - Additional study personnel
  - Expanded study populations or less restrictive inclusion/exclusion criteria
  - Augmented education/training of referring physicians
  - New advertising
  - Extension of expected time to achieve target accrual
- Failure to accrue a minimum number of subjects by the next review cycle (without acceptable justification) may lead to closure of the study.
- The IRB may allow certain studies involving rare conditions to continue despite low or no accrual.

## **Closures for Standard Follow-Up:**

- Studies may remain in standard follow-up for no more than 3 review cycles unless:
  - o The organization is contractually required to keep the study open.
  - The study includes a tissue bank at the organization.
  - The investigator can provide adequate justification for the study to remain open.
